In re Holocaust Victim Assets Litigation
Case No. CV96-4849

Certified Denial

to Claimant Michael Delsner

Claimed Account Owner: Martin Cohn¹

Claim Number: 221238/SB

This Certified Denial is to the claim of Michael Delsner (the “Claimant”) to a Swiss bank account potentially owned by the Claimant’s relative, Martin Cohn (the “Claimed Account Owner”).

All denials are published. Where a claimant has not requested confidentiality, as in this case, only the name of the bank has been redacted.

Information Provided by the Claimant

The Claimant submitted a claim stating that his maternal grandfather, Martin Cohn, was Jewish and was married to Meta Cohn, née Ritzewoller. The Claimant stated that his grandfather was born on 8 June 1873 and that his grandmother was born on 20 June 1883, both in Germany. According to the Claimant, his grandparents had one child, Carola Oelsner, née Cohn (the Claimant’s mother), who was born on 29 November 1907 in her parents apartment at Cuxhavenerstrasse 9 in Berlin, Germany. The Claimant explained that his grandfather was a stock broker (“*Bösenmakler*”) and banker in Berlin, and that he and his family later resided at Kaiseralle 222 (today Bundesallee) in Berlin-Wilmersdorf. In a telephone conversation with the CRT, the Claimant stated that his grandfather resided in Berlin all his life. The Claimant stated that both his grandparents were deported from Berlin to Theresienstadt, and from there to Auschwitz, where they perished.

The CRT’s Investigation

The CRT matched the name of Martin Cohn to the names of all account owners in the Account History Database and identified accounts belonging to individuals whose names match, or are substantially similar to, the name of the Claimed Account Owner. In doing so, the CRT used advanced name matching systems and computer programs, and considered variations of names, including name variations provided by Yad Vashem, The Holocaust Martyrs’ and Heroes’

Remembrance Authority, in Jerusalem, Israel, to ensure that all possible name matches were identified. However, a close review of the relevant bank records indicated that the information contained therein was inconsistent with the information the Claimant provided regarding the Claimed Account Owner. Accordingly, the CRT was unable to conclude that any of these accounts belonged to the Claimed Account Owner.

The CRT's Analysis

Identification of the Account Owner

The list below contains names of account owners that match the name of the Claimed Account Owner and the reasons why the CRT has concluded that the Claimed Account Owner and an account owner are not the same person. If an account owner's place of residence was published, that place of residence is also listed.

Name: Martin Cohn (Germany)

Account Identification Numbers: 1014652 to 1014655

Specifically, the Claimant stated that his grandfather, Martin Cohn, resided in Berlin, Germany, his entire life until his deportation. In contrast, the records show that the account owner resided in Germany and two other countries, neither of which the Claimant identified. The CRT also notes that the Claimant failed to identify the account owner's street address and the name of a company with which the account owner was associated. The CRT notes that the accounts were awarded to another claimant, who plausibly identified the account owner as her relative.

The Claimant should note that all accounts awarded by the CRT are published upon release on the CRT's website at www.crt-ii.org.

Right of Appeal and Request for Reconsideration

Pursuant to Article 30 of the Rules Governing the Claims Resolution Process, as amended (the "Rules"), the Claimant may appeal this decision or submit a request for reconsideration within ninety (90) days of the date of the letter accompanying this decision.

An appeal must be based upon a plausible suggestion of error regarding the CRT's conclusions set out in this decision. Any appeals which are submitted without a plausible suggestion of error shall be summarily denied. A request for reconsideration must be based on new documentary evidence not previously presented to the CRT that, if considered, would have led to a different outcome of the claim. Claimants should briefly explain the relevance of the newly submitted documents in view of the conclusions stated in the certified decision.

Account Identification Number, that forms the basis of the appeal and/or request for reconsideration.

Scope of the Denial

The CRT now considers the Claimant's claim to the accounts of Martin Cohn closed. Please note that this decision applies only to the Claim Number and Claimed Account Owner identified herein, and that the CRT is aware that the Claimant may have claimed accounts held by other persons or entities both in the Claim Number specified above and in other claims submitted to the CRT.

Certification of the Denial

The CRT certifies this Denial for approval by the Court.
