In re Holocaust Victim Assets Litigation

Certified Denial

to Claimant [REDACTED]

Claimed Account Owner: Walter Meyer¹

Claim Number: 300055/RT

This Certified Denial is to the claim of [REDACTED] (the “Claimant”) to a Swiss bank account potentially owned by the Claimant’s father, Walter (Moritz) Meyer (the “Claimed Account Owner”).

All denials are published, but where a claimant has requested confidentiality, as in this case, the names of the claimant, any relatives of the claimant other than the account owner, and the bank have been redacted.

Information Provided by the Claimant

The Claimant submitted a claim stating that Walter Meyer, who was Jewish, was the owner of a boys’ clothing store in Berlin, Germany, where he also resided until he fled Germany for the United States. The Claimant indicated that her father died in the United States in 1963. The Claimant did not indicate any academic or professional title held by her father.

The CRT’s Investigation

The CRT matched the name of Walter (Moritz) Meyer to the names of all account owners in the Account History Database and identified accounts belonging to individuals whose names match, or are substantially similar to, the name of the Claimed Account Owner. In doing so, the CRT used advanced name matching systems and computer programs, and considered variations of names, including name variations provided by Yad Vashem, The Holocaust Martyrs’ and Heroes’ Remembrance Authority, in Jerusalem, Israel, to ensure that all possible name matches were identified. However, a close review of the relevant bank records indicated that the information contained therein was inconsistent with the information the Claimant provided regarding the Claimed Account Owner. Accordingly, the CRT was unable to conclude that any of these accounts belonged to the Claimed Account Owner.

The CRT's Analysis

Identification of the Account Owner

The list below contains names of account owners that match the name of the Claimed Account Owner and the reasons why the CRT has concluded that the Claimed Account Owner and an account owner are not the same person. If an account owner's place of residence was published, that place of residence is also listed.

Name: W. Meyer (Berlin, Germany)

Account Identification Number: 5024832

Specifically, the Claimant stated that her father, Walter Meyer, was the owner of a boys' clothing store. The Claimant did not indicate any academic or professional title held by her father. In contrast, the records show that the account owner held such a title, which is inconsistent with the Claimant's father's profession as the owner of a clothing store. The CRT further notes that the Claimant did not identify the original owner of the account or the power of attorney holders, who were closely related to the account owner.

Name: W. Meyer (Germany)

Account Identification Number: 1011260

Specifically, the Claimant stated that her father, Walter Meyer, resided in Berlin, Germany. In contrast, the records show that the account owner resided in a different city, which is over 200 kilometers from Berlin. The CRT notes that Berlin is a major urban center whereas the account owner's city of residence is a small town, thus rendering it unlikely that a resident of Berlin would indicate the account owner's distant city of residence as his/her place of residence, even for the purpose of maintaining a Swiss bank account.

Name: Walter Meyer (Freiburg, Germany)

Account Identification Number: 1012308

Specifically, the Claimant stated that her father, Walter Meyer, resided in Berlin, until he fled Germany for the United States, where he died in 1963. In contrast, the records show that the account owner resided in Freiburg, which is over 800 kilometers from Berlin. The records further indicate that the account owner had a different fate.

The CRT has taken utmost care in matching the names of the person identified by the Claimant as a possible account owner to names of actual account owners identified in the Account History Database prepared pursuant to the investigation of the Independent Committee of Eminent Persons ("ICEP" or "ICEP Investigation"), which identified accounts probably or possibly belonging to Victims of Nazi Persecution, as defined in the Rules Governing the Claims Resolution Process, as amended (the "Rules"). The CRT has reviewed this claim carefully and analyzed matches to accounts belonging to account owners with alternative spellings of Walter Meyer's last name, which include Mayer and Meier, and has determined that these accounts did not belong to the Claimed Account Owner.

The Claimant should note that all accounts awarded by the CRT are published upon release on the CRT's website at www.crt-ii.org.

Right of Appeal and Request for Reconsideration

Pursuant to Article 30 of the Rules Governing the Claims Resolution Process, as amended (the “Rules”), the Claimant may appeal this decision or submit a request for reconsideration within ninety (90) days of the date of the letter accompanying this decision.

An appeal must be based upon a plausible suggestion of error regarding the CRT’s conclusions set out in this decision. Any appeals which are submitted without a plausible suggestion of error shall be summarily denied. A request for reconsideration must be based on new documentary evidence not previously presented to the CRT that, if considered, would have led to a different outcome of the claim. Claimants should briefly explain the relevance of the newly submitted documents in view of the conclusions stated in the certified decision.

If more than one account has been treated in this decision, the Claimant should identify the account, including, where available, the Account Identification Number, that forms the basis of the appeal and/or request for reconsideration.

Scope of the Denial

The CRT now considers the Claimant’s claim to the accounts of Walter Meyer closed. Please note that this decision applies only to the Claim Number and Claimed Account Owner identified herein, and that the CRT is aware that the Claimant may have claimed accounts held by other persons or entities both in the Claim Number specified above and in other claims submitted to the CRT.

Certification of the Denial

The CRT certifies this Denial for approval by the Court.
