In re Holocaust Victim Assets Litigation

Certified Denial

to Claimant [REDACTED]

Claimed Account Owners: Ludwig Weinheber and Sophie Neumann¹

Claim Number: 000892/MG

This determination is based on the claim of [REDACTED] (the “Claimant”) to a Swiss bank account potentially owned by Ludwig Weinheber and Sophie Neumann. The CRT did not locate an account belonging to Ludwig Weinheber and Sophie Neumann (Weinheber) in the Account History Database prepared pursuant to the investigation of the Independent Committee of Eminent Persons (“ICEP” or “ICEP Investigation”), which identified accounts probably or possibly belonging to Victims of Nazi Persecution, as defined in the Rules Governing the Claims Resolution Process, as amended (the “Rules”).

This Certified Denial is to a Swiss bank account potentially owned by the Claimant’s relative, Ludwig Weinheber under the name Ludwig Neuman (the “Claimed Account Owner”).

All denials are published, but where a claimant has requested confidentiality, as in this case, the names of the claimant, any relatives of the claimant other than the account owner, and the bank have been redacted.

Information Provided by the Claimant

The Claimant submitted a claim stating that her brother-in-law, Ludwig Weinheber, who was Jewish, may have held a Swiss bank account under the name Ludwig Neuman. The Claimant explained that her sister, Sophie Neumann had a Swiss bank account, which might have been transferred to her husband who held it under the name Ludwig Neuman, which is a combination of his first name, Ludwig, and an alternative spelling of his wife’s maiden name, Neumann. The Claimant also stated that her relative resided in Fürth and Nuremberg, Germany.

The CRT’s Investigation

The CRT matched the name of Ludwig Neumann to the names of all account owners in the Account History Database and identified accounts belonging to individuals whose names match,

or are substantially similar to, the name of the Claimed Account Owner. In doing so, the CRT used advanced name matching systems and computer programs, and considered variations of names, including name variations provided by Yad Vashem, The Holocaust Martyrs' and Heroes' Remembrance Authority, in Jerusalem, Israel, to ensure that all possible name matches were identified. However, a close review of the relevant bank records indicated that the information contained therein was inconsistent with the information the Claimant provided regarding the Claimed Account Owner. Accordingly, the CRT was unable to conclude that any of these accounts belonged to the Claimed Account Owner.

The CRT's Analysis

Identification of the Account Owner

The list below contains names of account owners that match the name of the Claimed Account Owner and the reasons why the CRT has concluded that the Claimed Account Owner and an account owner are not the same person. If an account owner's place of residence was published, that place of residence is also listed.

Name: Ludwig Neuman (Germany)

Account Identification Number: 1010789

Specifically, the Claimant stated that her relative, Ludwig Weinheber, held an account under the name Ludwig Neuman, which is a combination of his first name, Ludwig, and an alternative spelling of his wife's maiden name, Neumann. The Claimant also stated that her relative resided in Fürth and Nuremberg, Germany. In contrast, the records do not show that the account at issue was opened by, or held on behalf of, a third party, and show that the account owner resided in a city which is over 250 kilometers from Fürth and Nuremberg.

The Claimant should note that all accounts awarded by the CRT are published upon release on the CRT's website at www.crt-ii.org.

Right of Appeal and Request for Reconsideration

Pursuant to Article 30 of the Rules Governing the Claims Resolution Process, as amended (the "Rules"), the Claimant may appeal this decision or submit a request for reconsideration within ninety (90) days of the date of the letter accompanying this decision.

An appeal must be based upon a plausible suggestion of error regarding the CRT's conclusions set out in this decision. Any appeals which are submitted without a plausible suggestion of error shall be summarily denied. A request for reconsideration must be based on new documentary evidence not previously presented to the CRT that, if considered, would have led to a different outcome of the claim. Claimants should briefly explain the relevance of the newly submitted documents in view of the conclusions stated in the certified decision.

Scope of the Denial

The CRT now considers the Claimant's claim to the accounts of Ludwig Weinheber and Sophie Neumann closed. Please note that this decision applies only to the Claim Number and Claimed Account Owners identified herein, and that the CRT is aware that the Claimant may have claimed accounts held by other persons or entities both in the Claim Number specified above and in other claims submitted to the CRT.

Certification of the Denial

The CRT certifies this Denial for approval by the Court.
